Pastor's Note: Blue Is the Color of Hopefulness

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Dear Friends,

For centuries, the season of Advent was observed as a penitential season.

Sometimes, it was even referred to as the “Little Lent.” Also, as in Lent, violet or purple was the seasonal color.

During the ecumenical liturgical reforms of the 1970s, a strong consensus emerged that Advent should be a season of hope and anticipation, rather than penitence. Blue is the color of hopefulness — our hope in the Light of the World born on Christmas Day. Blue is the color of the sky in the morning just before sunrise; it is the last color the eye sees before the light returns.

That time, the time before first light — the dark, rich, blue time — is Advent time. The last Advent sunset and the first Christmas sunrise comes from Isaiah: “The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; upon those who lived

in a land of deep darkness a light has shone.”

In speaking about the decision to change our Advent preparations to include blue, the Worship and Fine Arts Ministry thought it might be of interest to remind ourselves of the church’s liturgical color cycle. Liturgical colors orient us to the season of the church year and help to engage our sense of sight in worship.

We begin the church year with Advent blue, then enter Epiphany — the season of light — when the color turns to white. White symbolizes purity, holiness, and virtue, as well as respect and reverence. White also marks pivotal events in the life of Christ that have become festival days of the church year (Baptism of the Lord, Transfiguration of Our Lord, Trinity Sunday, and Christ the King Sunday). And, white is used for weddings and funerals.

During Lent, purple is used starting Ash Wednesday and extending through Maundy Thursday. The church remains bare until Easter, when we return to white for the seven Sundays of Eastertide.

On Pentecost, the church is adorned in red — the color of fire that symbolizes the presence of God’s Holy Spirit.

Green is the color of new vegetation. It symbolizes the hope of new life, which is ours in the life of Jesus Christ. The color green is used for all other time periods (called Ordinary Time) not marked by a specific festival or season.

As we move into this “holyday” season, “may the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope.” (Romans 15:13).

Session Highlights: Gift Designated, Hires OK'd



The CHPC Session meets monthly in a hybrid format (in-person and via Zoom conferencing). Among the items approved during the Sept. 26 meeting were:

- A recommendation that Session designate the \$10,000 gift recently received from Bach T. Le to be divided, with \$5,000 used for the creation of a virtual meeting room at CHPC and \$5,000 donated to Church World Service for use by CHPC's newly formed Welcome Team in current refugee resettlement efforts.

- A motion from Staff Commission that Session approve a maximum employee Qualified Small Employer Health Reimbursement Arrangement (QSEHRA) reimbursement amount for 2023 of \$5,000.

- Approval of the church treasurer's monthly financial report, in which receipts for August 2022 of \$47,766.58 and total expenses for the

same period of \$49,865.63 were reported.

On Oct. 24, the monthly meeting was held virtually, via Zoom, due to the Camp Hill Borough Halloween Parade being held the same evening. Actions taken at that meeting included:

- Approval of the reinstatement of Barbara and Clyde McGeary to active membership at CHPC per their request.

- The call of a Special Congregational Meeting on Sunday, Nov. 20, at 11:30 a.m. in the Sanctuary. The purpose for the meeting is to approve adjusted pastors' terms of call for 2023.

- Approval of the hiring of Anita Kelch to provide childcare at CHPC for three hours on Sunday mornings at a rate of \$25 per hour, effective immediately.

- Approval of the hiring of an assistant preschool director (candidate to be determined) to work 10 to 15 hours per week at a rate

of \$15 per hour for the remainder of the 2022-2023 school year.

- Approval of the hiring of a preschool aide to work two mornings per week from 9 a.m. to noon at a rate of \$15 per hour for the remainder of the 2022-2023 school. JoJo Ruch, a CHPC Preschool teacher, has assumed the newly created position.

- Approval of the hiring of Katie Smith as Betweeners Monday/Tuesday assistant teacher for the Preschool to fill the vacancy created by moving JoJo Ruch to the aide position.

- Approval of a motion from the Worship and Fine Arts Ministry to offer wine as part of the reception to be held in Fellowship Hall following the Dec. 4 Music, Art and Drama series event.

- Approval of the church treasurer's monthly financial report (see Page 3 of this newsletter).

Current Fiscal Year Proving to Be Challenging


Total receipts for the first three months of the 2022-23 fiscal year were \$128,116.19, and total expenses were \$164,862.99, thus leaving us with a year-to-date deficit of \$36,746.80. The deficit was caused in part by three payroll periods in September and some lingering Mission at the Eastward expenses not offset by MATE income, which was mostly received in the prior fiscal year.

We now have filled all vacant staff positions, so 2022-23 is going to be a more challenging year financially. Thanks to everyone for your gifts!

French Drain Installed to Address Flooding Issues

If Noah came to CHPC in 2023, he would have no reason to organize the animals in twos. After months of planning, preparation, and work, the installation of a French drain along the basement's north side to address the periodic flooding after a hard rain is complete.

The project involved digging a trench from the Quilters and Crafters Room, through the men's bathroom, and into the west end of the kitchen. The many moving parts had to happen in a prescribed order and involved multiple contractors and volunteers. Despite several heavy rainstorms in recent months, we're happy to report that there has been no flooding. In conjunction with the drain installation, the

Quilters and Crafters Room and adjacent hallway received a much-needed new tile floor and a fresh coat of paint (as did a portion of the men's room and kitchen). Next time you're in the basement, check out the improvements!

Many hands helped to make this complex project a success. A special thanks to Jim Long, who evaluated our options, identified the best way forward (quality and cost), and created a workflow that the Property and Maintenance Commission helped manage. We appreciated the patience of the Quilters and Crafters, who lost the use of their room, and everyone who made do without a working stove during the project. Thanks to the Mission at the Eastward team and others, who emptied and restored

Per Capita Supports the PC(USA) System



The annual giving of all Presbyterians, in the form of our per capita offerings, is a “tie that binds” the entire church and benefits every congregation. Per capita provides the means to strengthen the connections of our work and build lasting relationships to help all Presbyterians share God’s love through mission and ministry. Per capita is the primary source of funding for the Office of the General Assembly and is how Presbyterians mutually and equitably share the costs of coming together to discern the Spirit’s leading for the future.

These monies are used to administer the responsibilities, functions, and mission of each governing body. The per-member amount for 2023 is \$31. Of this amount, \$18.75 is designated for

Carlisle Presbytery, \$2.40 is for the Synod of the Trinity, and \$9.85 is for the General Assembly.

Per capita funding serves and is a resource for our church as it:

- Maintains a physical office and staff at all three levels of governance.

- Provides training and leadership development for church officers, learning opportunities for pastors and members of congregations, and faith formation initiatives for youth through Camp Krislund, Youth Triennium, and other special events.

- Supports the health and well-being of congregations, providing tools and guidance for congregations searching for a pastor and offering assistance with conflict resolution, property issues, loans, insurance, and record-keeping.

- Provides oversight and preparation for those discerning God’s call to ministry.

- Supports and directs the administration of congregations’ participation in mission funding and hands-on mission initiatives.

- Strengthens congregations’ connections to the wider church through commissioners elected to biannual General Assembly meetings, support of the Presbyterian Historical Society in Philadelphia, and participation in the life of the Church Universal, as we seek to work and live in fellowship with “all persons in every nation.”

CHPC’s Session honors this commitment on behalf of our congregation by paying our full per capita assessment each year, which for 2023 will be just more than \$10,000.

Many of our members pay their own per capita assessment each year, assisting CHPC with this expense. Please consider paying the per capita for all in your family who are members of CHPC. This extra gift to the church will free monies in the CHPC budget to further our own mission efforts locally, while supporting our collaboration with our Presbyterian brothers and sisters in furthering the mission of Jesus Christ around the world.

Story Walk Returns for Christmas Eve 2022




Ministry with families and children is growing at CHPC!

Kirk Kids is the congregation's Sunday morning faith formation offering for preschool and elementary-age children. 
In 2018, Cathy married longtime friend Jon Emig. Together, they enjoy spending time with family
