Why Do We Sing What We Sing?

The Golden Age of Medieval Christianity

“Theology is faith seeking understanding.” –St. Anselm

The growth of cities, trade, and market economies in the 12th century brought about massive cultural upheaval, including a growing chasm between rich and poor.

Christianity remained a site of conflict and exchange.

Cathedral schools grew into universities, birthing the model of higher education still used today. With the rediscovery of ancient Greek texts, these universities became hotbeds for new methods in scientific inquiry, including theology, the “queen of sciences.”

Scholastic theology used rigorous conceptual analysis to embrace, in the words of famous scholastic Anselm of Canterbury, “faith seeking understanding.”

Universities and monasteries weren’t the only places experiencing change. For instance, Francis of Assisi, born into wealth, had a profound religious experience that led him to sell his worldly goods and minister to the needs of the poor. Soon, mendicant religious orders spread the language of faith and spirituality throughout the population. This form of *mystical theology* became a way to understand God from personal experiences, regardless of birth and economic status.

A dynamic tension between scholastic and mystical theology persisted. Thinkers like Bernard of Clairvaux sought to bring devotional life into the lives of ordinary people from beyond the wall of monasteries and universities. His strategy? Writing hymns and singing them in public everywhere he went.
